What are the four physical geographic regions of West Virginia and what major communities and natural resources are found within each region?

I can collaborate with my peers to develop a broader understanding of West Virginia's geography. I can write a paragraph based on research about a specific topic related to a physical geographic region of West Virginia.

Prior Knowledge/Prerequisite Skills]
Prior to this lesson, students should be familiar with the basic map skills and related vocabulary. It would be helpful for students to have introductory-level knowledge of natural resources in the state as well.

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Accommodations

- Provide leveled and/or annotated resources to students based on individual student needs

Learning Procedures

1. Activating Strategy: Mapping West Virginia

- a. Ask for student volunteer(s) to draw the outline of West Virginia on the board
- b. Request for additional student volunteers to divide the state into what they think are the 4 geographic regions. (1 volunteer per region)
- c. Compare with the labeled map (<u>WV Archives and History 4 Geographic Regions of WV</u>
- 2. Introduce the 4 physical geographic regions of West Virginia, outlining each one's major communities and the natural resources found within each region.

- 3. Divide the class into four groups. Assign each group a different region. Introduce students to the independent work activity.
 - Each student will research a topic of their choosing (communities, history, natural resources, etc.) of their assigned region. After conducting research, students will write a paragraph and illustrate pictures for their topic.
 - b. After all students have completed the independent activity, allow each group time to work together and create their own short "presentation" for the class
 - c. After all groups have shared, return to the West Virginia outline and repeat the mapping activity—this time adding in student-developed information for each of the 4 physical geographic regions.

Outcome & Assessment Strategies

Outcome:

Students will identify the 4 physical geographic regions of West Virginia and the major communities and natural resources found in each region.

Assessment Strategies:

- Graphic Organizer: Students label and read maps of West Virginia.
- Student Essays: Students engage their writing skills to explain features of West Virginia's physical geographic regions through informative writing.
- Class Presentations: Students demonstrate collaborative knowledge through brief visual and oral presentations for their peers.
